After a year's absence, volleyball returns to Chamois, Kempker says team is working hard to catch up

volleyball, Chamois has fielded a team of nine young ladies who are eager to get the action started.

"We can hold our own, but it's

definitely a growing year since we missed a season," said Assistant Coach Leisha Kempker, speaking on behalf of Head Coach Katie Kuschel, who has been out for personal reasons and will rejoin the team

"We didn't have a summer conditioning program or play any matches because we didn't know whether there would even be enough for a team this year," Kempker

soon. "Our goal is to be competitive and

said. "We'll have freshmen stepping out on the court against seasoned veterans from other teams that are completely prepared for the season. It will be tough, but the girls have impressed me in practices. They get here early, and they're eager to learn.'

With limited numbers, the key will be to keep everyone healthy, and beyond that, learning the game so they are competitive, with the overarching goal to win matches.

To do that, the team will rely on three players with experience.

Senior Alexis Slusser and juniors Katie Keilholz and MaKenna Wuelling, all of whom are members of the cross country team as well this fall, played volleyball at Chamois two years ago, and Slusser has two years of experience.

"Alexis is well-conditioned, and her previous years of play will be important for us," said Kempker of the middle hitter. "She is a consistent server and is working on position serving, which will be a big

Keilholz has spent a lot of time over

the summer working on her physical condition, sparked largely by her finish at the state cross country meet last fall. "She'll play middle hitter opposite Alexis, and it's new to her, but she's quick and will provide some much-needed blocking. She can get to any ball, and play the outside well. She

is open to change, and adapts quickly."

Wuelling is the team's primary setter.
"As a front row player, she's a strong hitter, but her being on the back row will help as well because of her quickness and ability to track the ball," said Kempker.

Sophomore Ariel Owens is an outside hitter, and has a great vertical jump. "She can play middle hitter in a pinch, and has a good serve," said Kempker. working on her timing to make her an effective blocker as well."

Sophomores on the team are Caitlin Slusser and Emely Farmer.

"Caitlin continues to improve her serving every day," said Kempker. "When she started, she couldn't get the ball over the net, but she's doing much better. She's probably going to play outside hitter, and is capable of playing the back row too.

Farmer will likely be a setter on the front row. "She'll also see time on the right side," said Kempker. "Her passing is better and she's really improved her serving. It's

Five harriers return to lead Chamois XC

Chamois returns two seniors in Richard Schaperclaus and Alexis Slusser, along with five others with experience on the cross country course, including juniors Katie Keilholz and MaKenna Wuelling, as all four earned a berth at last year's state

Coach John Leach returns with high hopes for the Pirates, who have nine

"It's nice to have those kids back with their experience," said Leach. "We've had some athletes work really hard in the offseason to prepare for this fall, and I think it will make a difference.'

The seniors, bring a lot of experience as well, and hope to get to state this fall.

"Richard ran one of the fastest times we've had in a while," said Leach, as Schaperclaus made it to state, finishing with a time of 19.39.14 to earn 82nd-place. "He went back to the drawing board. I feel he was disappointed at his finish at state, and the course at Jefferson City isn't easy. It takes a lot out of you, and it's not going

flat course in Columbia."

Slusser had a solid season in 2018-19, and has run a lot more than she has in the past, Leach said. "She's looking better in early practices, and I think she'll have a lot more confidence once the season starts," he added. "If we can keep her healthy, she has a great shot of returning to the state meet like she did last year."

Slusser posted a time of 25:27.64 to earn 89th overall.

Keilholz had a Lady Pirates-best 44th place in a time of 24:08.59 at Oak Hills Golf Course last year.

"She was not thrilled with her finish so

went out and worked harder, and put in a lot of miles after that," he added. "It really helped her with conditioning during the basketball season, and track, and now, after a summer of conditioning, she's looking really good in practice. I think she has high expectations to return to the state meet, and I believe she'll do even better come November."

Wuelling placed 133rd in a time of 27:34.66 at the state meet last November, and looks to return to the championship

The Chamois JH cross country team features a full girls team to get better as the season unfolds," Leach noted. and one lone boy as the fall season is set to kick off.

Coach John Leach said that while individual medals are great, he is really focused on helping the girls team vie for trophies.

"We have a good group of second-year runners that bring a lot of experience back from last year, and I think it will come together well as we get going," said Leach. "The girls have very good chemistry, and they are very competitive with each other, but it's constructive because they all want the others to do their best.

The team includes eighth-graders Madeline Gerloff, Eevie Halbert, Devin Slusser, Elsie Wuelling and seventh-grader Riley

Davis, and on the boys side, seventh-grader Caleb Keilholz.

Gerloff is coming of a solid seventh-grade season. "She's taller and I think she's faster this year," said Leach. "I really think she's going to beat all her times from last year. She loves to run, and I am highly optimistic that she will earn a lot of medals this

Halbert is improving her stamina at the long-distance running. "She stepped up last year at the meets, and I think she'll continue

Slusser is expected to improve her times as well. "She's starting to get into shape as the practices keep going, and I think she'll be even better once she gets to a real meet," said Leach.

Wuelling, meanwhile, ran well last year, and is primed to keep going as the fall season approaches. "She likes to run, and I think once we get going, I think she'll be in a position to medal in several meets.

Davis enters the fray for the first time. "She is learning how to run distance races, and I think by the end of the year, she may be in position to get a medal," said Leach. "She's going to push the other girls, regardless."

Keilholz as the lone Pirate out for cross country will not have the benefit of being pushed or competing against teammates, but in practice, he's been third or fourth when running against the high school team. "I think he's going to do some great things as a seventh-grader, even against the older boys," said Leach. "He's

"We have some great leadership among these young ladies, and that will be very helpful as the season unfolds," said









Heidger hopes strong summer equals great fall season

Linn softball coach Renee Heidger is encouraged by what she saw over the summer, and hopes that translates to a great fall season as the Lady Wildcats seek to improve on a 14-8 season.

"We have some versatility, and we're hoping to be competitive," she said. "We have a good nucleus of returning players, and at two camps over the summer, we had a good showing. We were very competitive, which makes me think we'll have a good

Linn plays a tough schedule, and with some quality tournaments along the way to districts, Heidger said the team should be in good shape come October. "We'll take it one game at a time, and hopefully everyone remains healthy, and improves," she said. "We have some talented players and some experience coming back, so we're really in a good position to do some good things."

SENIORS

Catcher Darby Nolting led the team with a BA of .400 last year, with three doubles and seven RBI, but her play behind the plate was outstanding. "She had a great season," said Heidger. "She's very quick and I had to move her from the outfield to catcher last year. I lost some speed in the outfield, but she really grew into the catcher's role. She's very athletic, with a strong arm and solid bat.

Third baseman Rachel Keilholz started at second base but will cover the hot corner this year. "She's a quiet player but she gets it done," Heidger said. "She was a consistent defensive player last season, and that's a big plus, not to have to worry about

Keilholz last year hit .258 with a double and a team-high 17 RBI. From the circle, she went 6-1 in seven starts, with 15 earned runs on 37 hits, with 32 strikeouts and 13 walks.

The third senior on the roster is Kennedy Frank, who returns to the team after not playing since her freshman year. "She's showing promise at the plate in practice," said Heidger. "We're still evaluating her defensive positions, but she's battling for a spot in the outfield."

JUNIORS

Lindsey Brandt, who hit .368 with four triples, a double and a home run, drove in seven last year while scoring 23 runs. The third-year starter will cover short stop, a position she's made her own.

"She's a very talented young lady," said Heidger. "Her consistency at the plate, whether it's finding the right pitch or holding out for a walk, is impressive. She finds a way to get on base, and I'll probably have her in the top three in the lineup."

Jessica Keilholz will be the go-to pitcher for the Lady Wildcats, and play at second base when she's not on the rubber. "She's looked very sharp all summer," said Heidger. "Her velocity has increased and she has better movement on the ball. Jessica can hit well too, and has been driving the ball with authority."

J. Keilholz last year went 10-60 (.167), but four of those hits were doubles, and she accounted for four RBI while scoring eight

Abby Klebba hit .245 last season, with

a pair of doubles and two triples with eight RBI, is battling for first base but may also be a designated player this year, a role she filled last season. "She hits in streaks, and we'll need her to be consistent at the plate,' said Heidger.

Riley Senevey may play middle infield or find a home in the outfield. "She's a good player with a good arm," said Heidger, noting Senevey played in left field last year. "She reads the ball well, and can get there. Riley was a consistent hitter over the summer, and we'll need that this fall."

Destiny Riley played some at first base and other times covered second base last year. "She has a lot of talent, and she'll compete for a spot in the infield," said Heidger. "She was streaky at the plate a year ago, but her bat speed is quicker, and she'll put the ball in play.'

Elyse Klouzek and Abby Sweezer were primarily JV players last year that are working for an outfield position. "Elyse has improved a lot, and she's good at tracking the ball," said Heidger. "She's working on her arm strength, and is starting

"I have been very impressed with Madison so far and look for her to make an




have been running with the Westphalia club team and have traveled to competitions last year. Their experience with racing will definitely give them a leg up early in the season as they already understand a bit of race strategy.






