I read something recently that really

Back then, however, it was just awesome to be able to get away from the grind, even for a little while.

My body would reset; I would get sleepy when the sun went down, and wake up with the sun.

I would like to do more of that, to be honest. If I could just find the time.

Another thing I will admit is better is not having to carry 5-gallon water jugs half a mile back to camp.

This year, we moved from the heat of summer into the heat of fall, and then some nice days before the snow hit, and through it all, teams from around the county gave it

Kuschel wants a district championship this season

successful post-season, but ended last season in a 42-40 heartbreaker to St. James in the district championship, and Coach Klayton Kuschel wants a deeper run this

"We'll have a better season," he said. "I'm confident in that. We have more experience, and this is my second year as head coach, which means the guys understand me a little more, and I understand them. We have a better relationship and they understand the system and what we want to accomplish. Our returners were big offensive threats last year, and I expect that to be the case again. All around, we should be a team that can win our district."

Having said that, Kuschel understands that every game matters, and the goal is to approach each one independently. "We have to make good decisions every night," he said. "The guys understand that we have to show up ready to play every game, and make the most of our opportunities.'

Traditionally, Chamois has been a strong defensive team, and last year held teams in the low 50s, but averaging only 40 points a game won't cut it.

"It doesn't matter how well your defense plays if you don't score enough points, so we're really focused on adding 10 to 12 points a game," said Kuschel. "The guys played really well over the summer. I wasn't sure what to expect, but they really stepped it up, and showed that they've come a long way since last season.'

Chamois has four seniors on the roster.

Devin Warren, a 6-3 guard, is the most offensive-minded player on the team. "His leadership is second to none, and he's doing very well in practice so far," said Kuschel. "He was injured over the summer but it hasn't slowed him down. I expect him to be a big part of our offense.'

Warren led with 15 points in the district title game last year, and finished with second-team All-District honors. He averaged 12.8 points and 2.2 rebounds per

game over the season.
Richard Schaperclaus (6-0 point guard) has a lot of experience at the varsity level and his summer effort was outstanding, Kuschel said. "He's taken great strides to get to this point, and he will only get better," the coach added. "He's a good leader and hard worker, and he's scrappy. He's constantly getting after it, and that energy will be important."

Brandon Dodson, a 6-1 guard, is another scrappy player who likes to mix it up. "He drives well, and isn't afraid to get in there and fight for the ball," said Kuschel. "He's come a long way with his shot, and I like the way he hustles on every play.'

Rounding out the seniors is Dawson Haslag, a 6-0 guard. "He's a role player, doing the dirty work that doesn't always get the credit he deserves," said Kuschel. "His scoring and rebounding will be big for us this year, and he's got some speed.'

Nathan Nolte (6-5 post) will create some issues for opponents. "His length in the post and his ability to shoot the three make him a difficult match-up for anyone, said Kuschel. "He put on some size and

filled out, which makes him solid inside but he's also a very offensive-minded player so he's always looking for ways to put the ball in the hole. He's a leader by example, and pretty much lives in the gym. He's always here shooting, and gets whoever else he can to join him."

Nolte last year averaged 10.1 points and 4.3 rebounds per game.

Eli Deppe, another junior, is a beast at 6-4 and will be the team's primary post player. "He's a bruiser, that's for sure," said Kuschel. "He's consistently beating around the inside, looking for a rebound. Eli has a lot more confidence this year, and he's starting to develop more of an offensive mentality. That's a piece we've been missing so it's nice to have that coming in."

Sophomore Mason Lamb (5-10 guard) will split time between varsity and JV. "He's a decent shooter, and just finds a way to be in the right place at the right time a lot," said Kuschel. "Mason has a great mind for the game and works well off the

Playing primarily JV but with time at the varsity in spots will be sophomores Caine Schaben (5-9 guard), Ethan Halbert (5-5 guard), and freshmen Zain Slusser (6-2 post), Tyler Brandt (6-0 point guard), Shannon Cowans (6-0 guard) and Waylon Carter (6-3 post).

Schaben is playing his first year at the high school level. "He's a very scrappy

Leach confident in team's ability to notch more wins

speed, and Lady Pirates coach John Leach said the key to a good season will be consistent play from everyone.

"We need to do a better job in the post stopping opponents, especially on rebounding, when we've given up extra points," said Leach. "We also need to be cleaner on setup, execute our plays, and finish them or we're giving up too much on offense. It's a balance, but if we can do these things consistently, we'll pick up a few more wins and have a better season overall."

Leach said that winning more games than last year, when the Lady Pirates finished 9-15, is an important goal for the team. "We let too many close games get away from us," he said. "We need to be winning those games. We play a very tough schedule, but there are teams we can beat, and we are going to do everything we can to do it. There are games no one expects us to win, and our goal is to be competitive, and maybe come away with some upsets. We are going play as well as we are capable of playing, and leave it all on the court."
Senior Alexis Slusser, a 5-7 forward,

has stepped into a leadership role this year. "She's been a huge part of the program since seventh grade, and has played various roles," said Leach. "She should be very effective on both ends of the floor, and her positive and encouraging attitude are also important.'

Senior Claire Brandt (5-7) did not play last year but returns to battle in the post. "I'm hopeful and excited about what she

can do in the middle," said Leach. "Her post play is good, and she can step out and shoot the three. Right now she's getting back into basketball shape, and I think she'll factor heavily in our run at districts.'

The final senior is 5-5 guard Chloe Holloway. "She's also working hard to get into basketball shape," said Leach. "She hasn't played since eighth grade, so she's got some catchup to do, but she's turning into a good shooter who could provide us eight to 10 points game. She hustles on every play, and is a wonderful addition to the team.'

Junior Katie Keilholz, a 5-6 guard, led the team last year with 20 points a game while grabbing nearly six rebounds per contest, which led to first-team All-District and All-Conference honors.

"She's got a tremendous work ethic, and is a great athlete," said Leach. "She's recovered from her mishap at state cross country, and I think she will wow people on the court. I feel she can increase her scoring average, even though other teams are going to double-team her a lot. They did that last year and she still led the conference in scoring, which just shows how athletic she is. I am really excited to see how well she does."

Keilholz set a school season record for made three-pointers with 87, and hit 78% from the stripe.

Fellow junior MaKenna Wuelling, an explosive 5-5 point guard, has held that role the last two years, and will continue leading the offense this winter. "She picked up her scoring last year, and we had to have

11.67 and grabbed 6.7 rebounds a game in 2018, which led to first-team All-District and second-team All-Conference nods. 'She will emerge as a top scorer, and take some pressure off Katie. MaKenna wants to win, and she's a tenacious player.

Junior guard, 5-11 Veronica Slack, has shown steady improvement. working hard on improving her fitness to run the floor better, and she's a great addition to this team," said Leach. "She hung in there last year and did what we asked of her, and I think this year her size will help us defend in the post.

Chamois has two sophomores in 5-6 guard Ariel Owens and 5-10 post player Abby Keilholz.

"Ariel got some experience last year as freshman and learned a lot from the upper classmen," said Leach. "I'm optimistic about her ability to score, and her defense is pretty solid. She's more aggressive as a guard and is coming along very well."

Keilholz, meanwhile, played AAU basketball all summer and has made great strides in her game. "She'll be a big part of our post play," said Leach. "We'll need her to battle for rebounds and add scoring on putback shots."

Rounding out the squad is 5-5 freshman guard Alex McKague. "She played summer ball with us, and has come a long way," said Leach. "She's starting to understand

Cowans is one of the most athletic players on the team, and just finished cross country, during which he qualified the state meet. "Shannon is quick and can jump," said Kuschel. "He's still gaining experience but he's making good strides.'

Carter is only in his second year of organized basketball, but Kuschel said he's learning fast. "He's coming around, and his inexperience will be a factor, but he's a good rebounder, and it's nice to have a big kid in the middle," Kuschel added.

The Pirates will play in the Tipton and Belle tournaments this year, and Kuschel said he's looking forward to them.

"We would like to win both of them," he said. "With smaller schools at these tournaments, we should be very competitive. Our schedule is pretty tough but I'm hoping it will pay off when we get to districts. We

want to bring back that winning tradition."

Kuschel is joined once again by assistant coaches Jacob Trachsel and Ethan Hagenhoff.





Crouch to use more offense-minded approach

Coach Clay Crouch, returning for his fourth year at Linn, said he's looking to be more offensive-minded this year.

We've played pretty good defensively, but I want our players to believe in the idea of taking the shot if it's there," said Crouch. "With our size and athleticism, we have an opportunity to put more points on the board. That mindset is something we've been working on in practice, and I think the kids are buying into it a little more each

Last year, the Wildcats ended the year at 15-11 and had a strong run to the finish, winning 10 of the last 13 games after a 5-8 start to the season.

Despite entering the Class 3, District 9 tournament as the seven seed, the Wildcats were ready for Blair Oaks, but came up short after a valiant effort in a 73-58 loss. "This loss stung a bit," said Crouch.

"The last loss always does, especially when the kids played with all their heart and did what we asked but still came up short.'

Crouch added that he was proud of the way the team played together.

"We truly grew as a program from day one," said Crouch following the loss. "I told the kids that we have to set a culture and it has started to take place. We want kids to work hard, play defense and be unselfish as a team, and they have started to embrace that. That's a testament to the kids, and hopefully that starts the Wildcat

The coach said the team's goals include being competitive in the conference and doing well at districts.

"We always hope to do well against conference teams, and we certainly want a better result at districts than we had last year," said Crouch. "We're not going to get ahead of ourselves though. We're taking it one game at a time. I want us to make good decisions on every play, and play consistently on both ends of the floor. It's the little things that add up to make a successful program, and these guys are working hard to do that. I'm very optimistic about our season."

This year's team features four seniors that will factor heavily into the success of

"All of them have put in a lot of effort over the last three years, and we will rely on them for leadership," said Crouch.

Senior Drew Voss, a 6-5 post player, earned second-team All-Conference last year and returns as a good leader for the Wildcats. He scored 7.4 points and grabbed 5.9 rebounds a game in 2018.

"He's an anchor for our defense," said Crouch. "He's improved a lot, and hopefully we can get him to score a little more this year. He's a good rebounder and does the little things we need him to do."

Playing guard/forward, 6-2 senior Jackson Voss brings a 6.2 PPG average back to the team, along with 3.5 rebounds

"Jackson is playing better defense, and will likely cover the opponent's best offensive player this year," said Crouch. "He's a sneaky shooter and can hit pretty much from anywhere. We want to expand his role some this year. He's a good kid and I look for him to be a solid leader.

The third senior on the roster is 5-7 guard Parker Patterson, who scored six points and snagged a couple rebounds per game last year. "He works hard and has great energy," said Crouch. "Parker sets the tone in practice, and he's really a pretty good shooter. He wants to do all he can to help the team win.'

Senior Alex Grellner, a 6-3 guard/ forward, has improved on his shooting from last season, during which he scored 4.2 points a game to go with 2.8 rebounds on average.

"His skills overall have improved a lot over the summer," said Crouch. "In practice, he has been more aggressive in going to the hole and rebounding, and we'll need that this year."

The final senior on the roster is newcomer Chris Kmiec, who at 5-9 is trying roundball for the first time, and will play on the frosh squad. "He wanted to go out with a bang and try something new, said Crouch. "He's a fun kid to have on the team, and just loves being out there any chance he gets.'

Linn's returning top scorer from a year ago is 6-6 junior Caleb Maassen, who posted 14.6 points a game while grabbing 5.9 rebounds on average, also a team high.

"He just keeps getting better," said Coach Crouch. "His work ethic is solid, and he's put a lot of time and practice to improving his game. Caleb drives well, but he can also pull up for the jumper, and he's very aggressive in the middle on rebounding. I expect he will have another


McKim pitched in 2.4 points and one rebound a game last year.





begins his 14th year as a head coach, said he's very excited about the prospect of a winning season, especially since almost all his players from last year are back on the

"We didn't have the season we quite wanted last year," said Robertson, as the Comets finished the 2018-19 campaign at 9-15 with a 3-4 mark in the Show-Me Conference, and lost 56-40 to Father Tolton in the Class 3, District 9 tournament.

"In the biggest game of the season against one of the best teams our kids came out and played one of their best games," said Robertson after the loss. "Tolton has great size and athleticism and our kids hung right in there.

Two big factors stood out, as Tolton scored 14 points off turnovers while Fatima put up seven; and in the second-chance category, Tolton held a 13-2 scoring edge.

"We're working on those aspects of the game," said Robertson of this year's team. "That game stung because we played well and were in the game, but as we look forward to this season, we're in pretty good shape.

Last year's overall campaign was hampered by physical challenges.

We had a lot of injuries that plagued us at different times, and we just never hit our stride," said Robertson. "It was hard for the group to find a rhythm, especially after Brett Werner suffered a season-ending ankle injury just after Christmas.'

Werner (6-2) is back and healthy, and brings a 22.1 points-per-game (PPG) average to the floor, along with seniors Cole Lehmen (13.0 PPG) and Mason Stuecken (5.6 PPG), juniors Dawson Huhn (3.4 PPG), Carter Karst (3.0 PPG) and Luke Boyce (2.0 PPG), and sophomores in Lee Verslues (12.2 PPG), Leo Peters (4.0 PPG) and Jacob Vanderfeltz (3.5 PPG).

"Brett averaged 22 points a game when he was healthy," said Robertson. "He was great at attacking and finishing around the rim. He also has the ability to knock down the three-pointer.'

Lehmen, at 6-2 led the team in scoring last year, and is a returning All-Conference player. "Cole is a typical knock-down shooter," Robertson added. "He's a good leader on the floor and did a good job last year of leading our transition attack.


