Perspective: Neither Rain, Nor Sleet, Nor A Broken Tooth ...

When I got home, I used a pair of tweezers to pull out the loose shards of enamel and hoped for the best.

That process took several days and even later, I would feel a piece of broken tooth slip free and I would spit it out.

Having an exposed tooth like that is not fun. The pain continued for a long time but again, I didn't like the alternative, so I just dealt with it.

Eventually, the tooth settled and I still have it. Every time I look at my teeth in the mirror, I think about how it became the

smile of an orc and I smile.

That was going through my head when I realized a couple of weeks ago that what remained of my broken tooth had again formed a dagger that was cutting my cheek.

Alas, it was time to do something about it.

Over the years, I have had a love-hate relationship with dentists but the folks at Huntline Dental Group in Westphalia have been good to me.

Because of sensitive teeth, I always get extra numbing agent, so much so that after a cleaning, I can't feel my face for a few hours. It's good stuff, whatever they use.

When I sat in the chair, I contemplated whether it would be better to have the dentist pull the tooth or have some thug curb-stomp my head in the parking lot.

After a week, the pain was worse and I had visions of meeting an oral surgeon that would have to do something drastic.

Instead, I returned to Huntline, and to ensure proper healing, a thin layer over the empty socket was reopened with a sharp instrument. Maybe an awl, I don't know.

All I do know is that this procedure was done without the benefit of a painkiller but I got through it. The bad news? I was told to brush aggressively, irritate the socket and draw blood to promote healing.

I had never heard of that approach but I'm convinced it worked as the pain has all but vanished.

My tongue visits are more interesting now. It's like I'm touring a wooden fence and suddenly find a plank missing.

Through it all, I enjoyed my visits around the county. I am sad the Chamois girls will not have a basketball team this year due to a lack of players but hopefully, the team will resume play next year.

Welcome to new Linn coach Braden Ham, who impressed me with his philosophy. We have a great group of players and coaches around the county and I'm excited about the upcoming season.

Pirates return 3 seniors, Bates optimistic this year

Chamois returns three seniors to the boys' basketball team and Coach Robbie Bates is optimistic that this experience and the improvements he's seen since last year will give the Pirates an opportunity to vie for a district title.

"These seniors know how close they were last year," said Bates, in his second year with the Pirates. "They have taken steps to fill the gaps left with the seniors who graduated last year, and their leadership will be important."

Chamois battled in a low-scoring Class 1, District 10 semifinal but came up just short last year in a 30-28 loss to Higbee on the road.

"We held Higbee to half the points they were averaging a game," said Bates following that contest. "We simply struggled on the offensive end, and we did not take advantage of some opportunities to get the ball inside when it was available."

Senior Mason Lamb (6-0 guard) was key in that game as he held Higbee's best scorer to zero points. "He went on to score 30 in the championship, so I was very pleased," said Bates. "Mason has come a long way over the summer offensively, and he'll be a threat on the wing and around the basket. He's a versatile player and I expect he'll be matched up with the best opponents with the job of keeping them off the board."

Senior Caine Schaben, (5-9) who had been the team's point guard, will play off the ball this year though he'll have some ball-handling duties. "He did a good job but this will make him better as we look for him to score more," said Bates. "He'll be a

solid defensive player too, and he can rebound. Our ability to guard will be better. He really stepped up over the summer and I think that will continue."

Eli Paulsmeyer (6-1 forward) is the third senior. "He's made big strides since last year," said Bates. "He's more aggressive and his ability to score has improved tremendously. His presence around the basket and rebounding are better too. It's night and day compared to last year."

The team's lone junior is Tyler Brandt, a 5-11 guard, who played his freshman year but did not suit up last season. "He'll give us depth on the perimeter and has the potential to be a solid ball-handler and defender," said Bates. "He can shoot from the outside when he gets his feet set. I'm pleased with his energy and progress."

Sophomore Aaron Kirsch likewise did not play last year and is doing his best to catch up. "He has a chance to show a lot of improvement," Bates said. "He works hard

every day in practice as he learns the system."

Five freshmen round out the squad, with Caleb Keilholz (5-9) taking the role of point guard for the conceivable future.

"Caleb is one of those players I've come to realize is consistent, day in and day out," said Bates. "There's no up or

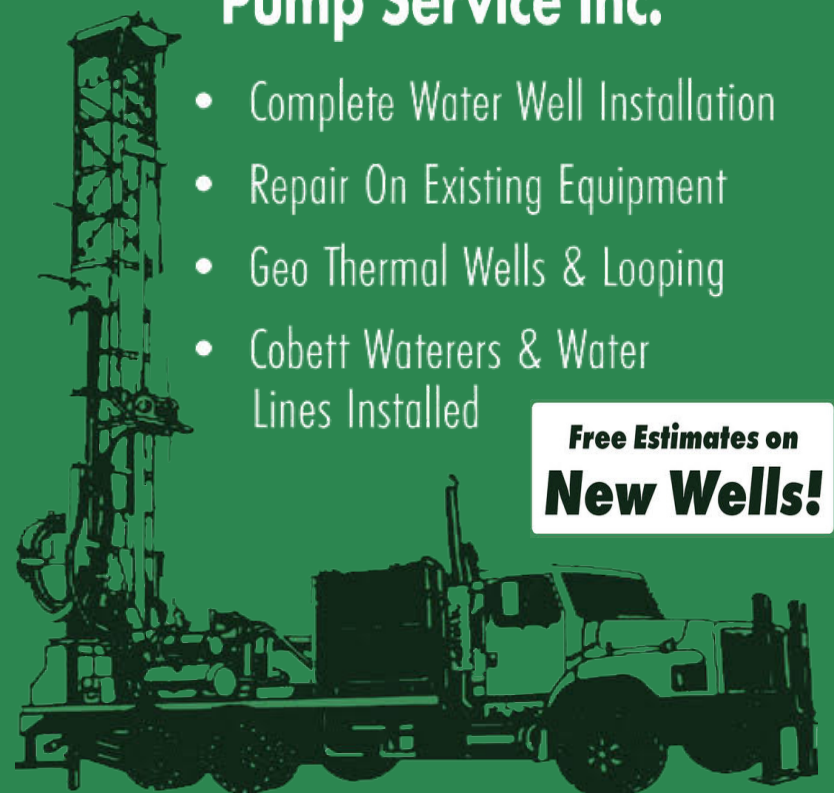

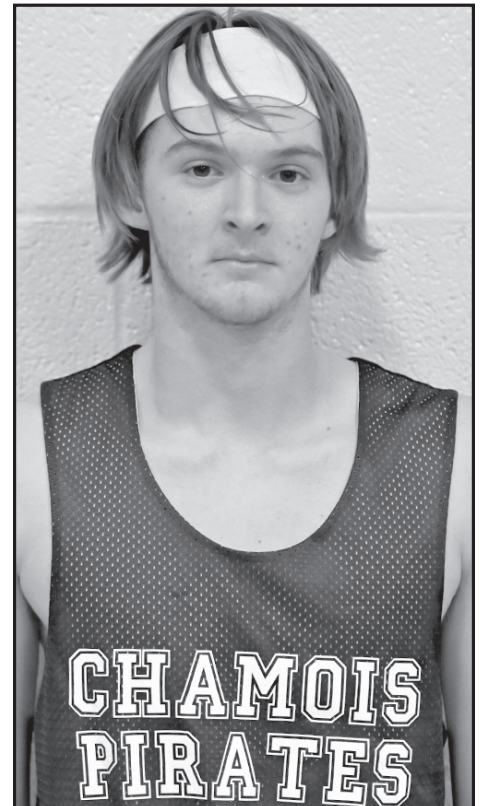

down with him. You're going to get his best every time. He will take care of the ball and lead the offense. Caleb knows when to attack and when to pass, and over time, he'll develop into a solid scoring threat."

Skyler Bottoms, a 5-11 forward, is a threat near the basket on both ends of the court. "He's made progress from his eighth-grade year and he's learning to be more consistent. He knows what it takes to be a solid player. Skyler has the potential to guard everywhere on the court."

Landen Northway (5-8 forward) has depth in the post and is working hard to improve. "I love having him in the program because he wants what's best for the team. He's learning his role and what he can do to make the team better."

Rounding out the freshman group is William Kirsch, a 5-8 forward currently recovering from an injury. Bates expects him to rejoin the team in January.

"When he gets back, he'll bring energy to the team," said Bates. "He can guard multiple positions and his offensive effort will get him time on the floor."

Kirsch will focus on being a good backup post player as he works on his perimeter role.

Of these nine players, seven have played for Bates, either in JH or at the high school level. "I know them pretty well," he said. "They know me as well, and making the move from junior high to high school is an easy transition because they don't have to learn a new system. It also allows me to add layers to our defensive schemes."

On the whole, Bates said if the team can hold opponents to below 50 points, there's a good chance the Pirates can win a lot of games. "We play a very tough schedule and it's not so much the wins and losses along the way, but how we perform at districts," he said. "Our schedule will get us ready, especially since we're the smallest school in the conference, which means we're playing bigger schools all year. We have the potential to put points on the board with more people scoring. Last year, teams focused on Nate Nolte and tried to shut him down. With several players that can score, they won't be able to focus on one guy."

Last year, the Pirates finished with a 5-11 record and nearly made it to the district championship game.

"We may not have the best record but we're going to be very competitive in every contest," said Bates. "It will make for an exciting season, and we'll be fun to watch."

Chamois opens the year with a game at home against Vienna on Nov. 23, starting at 7:30 p.m.

Ham takes the helm of senior-laden Linn boys squad

Linn coach Braden Ham didn't know what to expect when he took over the boys basketball program earlier this year but his experience has been "better than amazing" and he is looking forward to a solid year on the hardwood.

"From Day 1, I've been blown away by the willingness of parents to be flexible with scheduling and the support has been incredible," he said. "The kids have been very coachable and the parents have made it easy on me. The people here are great and have been very good to me, especially as an outsider."

Ham hails from the southwest area of Missouri, graduating from Neosho and returning as an assistant coach for three years after getting his start at Silex in the 2014-15 season.

"I gained valuable experience at Silex but I wanted to get back to this area," said Ham, who spent the 2017-18 season as head coach at Kirksville. "I'm somewhat familiar with Jefferson City and this area, and I'm very pleased to be here."

After developing a summer schedule on the fly, Ham began to build relationships with his players ahead of this winter's season.

"My patience was really tested when I took over the junior high program," said Ham. "I hadn't coached that level before this year, and truthfully, it made me a better coach. I wanted to be creative with our plays but I had to make sure the kids understood what I wanted them to do. Mainly, I wanted them to understand accountability to themselves and each other, which are qualities they'll use later in life."

Between the summer months and fall JH schedule, Ham and his players became accustomed to each other.

"They all understand where I'm coming from and where I want this team to go," he said. "We had pretty good participation over the summer and I'm excited about the winter season."

About 90% of the kids on the roster took part in summer camps and other activities, and this group has formed the core of Wildcats expected to fill out the varsity roster.

Ham said he expects the team to be more of an offensive-oriented squad though he's not looking to shoot the lights out.

"I'm not expecting to score 70 or 80 points a night," he said. "We're still going to work our butts off on defense. You can hustle on every play and even if someone is not a great defensive player, they can be functional if they hustle and work hard."

That being said, Ham added that a few players can shoot any time, and several are good ball-handlers. "We'll have some flexibility, which will be fun to watch," he said. "We want to push the ball but play with control."

Linn finished the 2020-21 season at 16-9 with a sectional loss to Monroe City. That team had eight seniors.

This year, Linn has five seniors.

Austin Grellner, a 5-10 guard, is a good shooter with a high release. "He can get down and guard but he also finishes well around the rim," said Ham. "We're working with him to improve his communication, but Austin is a strong player and a good teammate."

Keagan Heywood (5-11 guard), the team's only left-handed shooter, is one of the better passers on the team. "He provides a spark for his teammates," said Ham. "He can really juice them up. While he doesn't have a big vertical, Keagan is a solid

Lady Wildcats rebuilding this year with 11 players

Linn girls basketball coach Brandi Moore said this will be a rebuilding year with the loss of several players who saw a lot of playing time last season.

"I'm excited to see who will take advantage of the opportunities with new positions opening up," said Moore, who will be assisted this year by Coach Ron Lebel. "We'll look a little different this year but I'm expecting us to have success."

Linn (13-10, 3-3) ended last season with a second-place finish at the Class 3, District 8 tournament at Stover in a 62-41 loss to Tipton.

This season opens with three seniors, guards Hannah Hall (5-4), Macci Blauvelt

(5-4), and Ellie Monnette (5-4).

Hall brings some quickness to the team. "She's a good shot a pretty good defender," said Moore. "She can handle the ball too and I look for her to be involved with our passing game."

Blauvelt has been shooting well from the outside and working hard on defense. "She does a good job creating space for her shot," Moore added.

Monnette is a very aggressive defensive player. "She's not afraid to get physical and fight for the ball," said Moore. "She hustles all the time and puts herself in a good position for rebounds."

Junior Aushara Hostetler (5-8), led the

team with 16.4 points and 5.5 rebounds per game while hitting 60% from the line and 34% from three-point range.

"She is a strong all-around player," said Moore. "Aushara leads by example and has improved her vocal leadership as well. I look for her to be our leading scorer again."

Hostetler earned first-team Central Missouri Sportswriters & Sportscasters Association and second-team All-Conference honors last year.

Fellow junior Autumn Baker (5-6) also brings experience from last year's second-place district finish. "She's very athletic and quick, and aggressive on defense," said

Moore. "Her ball skills and shooting are improving, and her athleticism will be showcased in our press defense this year."

There are no sophomores on the team this year.

Freshmen include 5-8 guards Kiana Hostetler and Vivien Baker, Emma Monnette (5-6 guard), Kylie Peters (5-4 guard), Hannah Hackmann (5-6 guard), and 5-8 guard Natasha Jewell.

"As a group, these girls are working

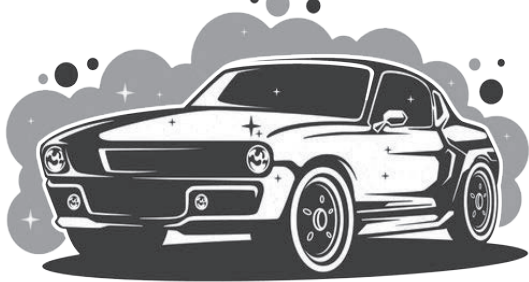

presence inside on both sides of the ball.”
Dillan Blauvelt at 5-10 is a productive guard. “He’s unique in that although he’s not a big kid, he’s always in the right place defensively,” said Ham. “He’s very smart, especially on defense. He does things before you think to ask. He’s always watching and you can tell the gears are turning. I’ve been impressed with his recognition and reaction. There’s no delay.”

Austin Wolfe (5-8 guard) gets after it on defense. “He’s a Tasmanian devil,” said Ham. “He’s a firecracker and very competitive. Austin has worked on his shot and he’s super quick. His hustle has been impressive and there’s always a place for a guy who works his tail off.”

Aidan Kline, a 6-4 forward, can jump and with his build and strength, will be a solid defender. “He’s worked hard in the weight room, which is a skill, putting on weight,” said Ham. “He wants to win, and he’s long, which will make him an intimidating defender. Aidan is a team-first

kind of guy who wants everyone to do well.”

Linn’s lone junior is Zach Dodson, a 6-1 forward who is athletic and strong. “He’s wiry and a great cutter,” said Ham. “Zach is becoming more of a passer but he has a nice soft touch around the rim. With his size and speed, he’ll give us some flexibility in our matchups.”

Sophomore Noah Hall (5-10) will be the team’s starting point guard but he will also play the wing at times in transition. “He’s a smooth operator with good handles,” said Ham. “Noah dribbles well and his shot is pretty. He has good vision and body control, especially around the iron. He maintains that control, which is very important to what we’re trying to do. He’s working hard on defense and has the

ability to become a great defender.”

Sophomore Ashton Keilholz, a 5-10 guard, and 6-1 forwards sophomores Zach Hatfield and Seth Wolfe will play JV but will see time at varsity. “I want them to play together on JV but also get comfortable at the varsity level,” said Ham.

Players on the JV roster are sophomores Curtis Deeken (5-10), Jett Maassen (5-6), Hank Klouzek (5-9), and Britt Winslow (5-11), and freshmen Austin Dudenhoeffer (5-10), Bobby Winkelman (5-9), Devon Brandt (5-8), and Trevor Brandt (5-8).

“These guys are working hard at every practice,” said Ham, who is assisted by Mike Nolting. “Mike is doing a great job with them, and they are responding well to what we’re developing as a program.”

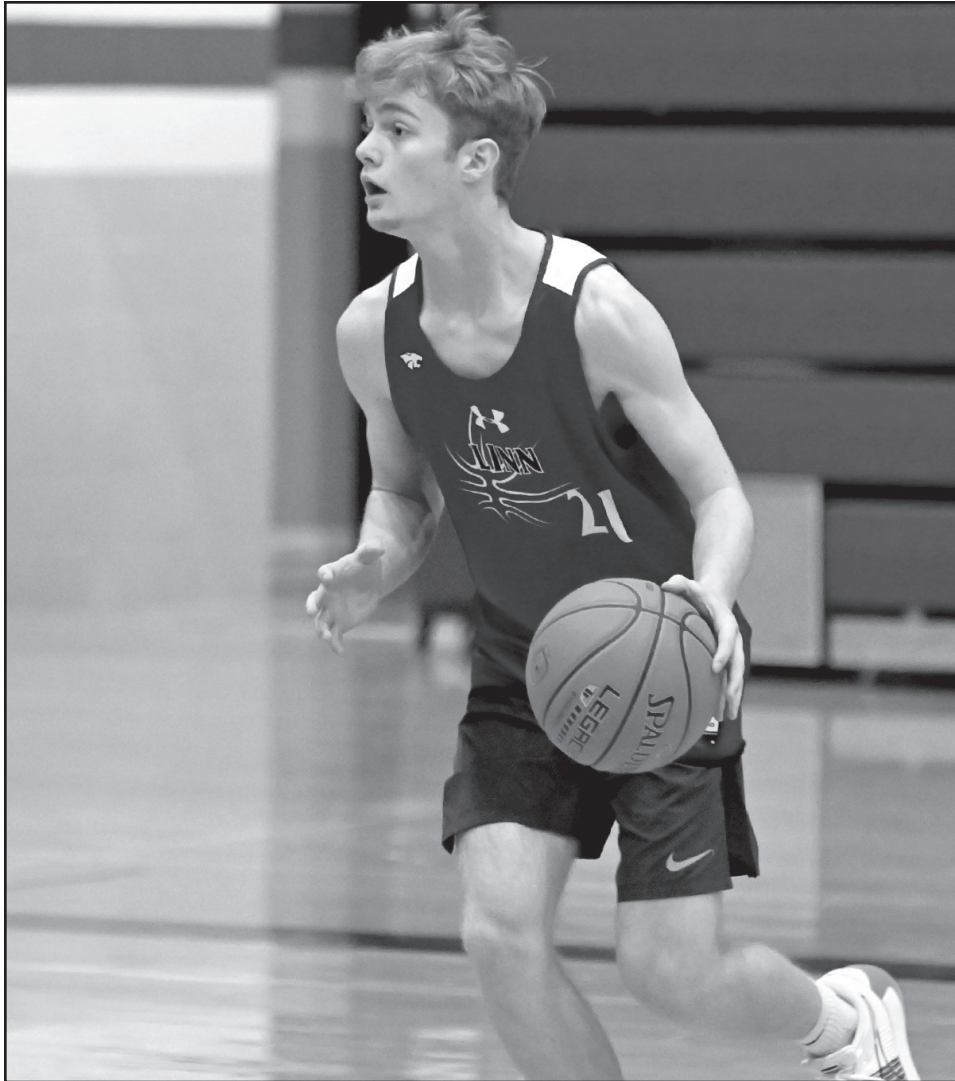

Robertson hopes a tough schedule prepares Comets for districts

Fatima coach Ryan Robertson is hopeful that a tough schedule will prepare the Comets for districts and a postseason run after ending 2020-21 in the district semis.

"Our schedule is as brutal as ever," he said. "We're not as worried about wins and losses because what matters is how we're playing come February, and I hope this pays dividends."

Entering the year with five seniors, Robertson is looking forward to a stronger showing.

"We're as excited as ever to get the season going," he said. "We feel the ceiling is up to us. We have a lot of experienced players back with good height and strong shooters."

Fatima will hang its hat on half-court man defense. "We'll press at times but for the most part, we want to run straight man-to-man," said Robertson. "Offensively, we'll do everything on straight motion with good shot selection. We're not going to rush into anything but players with proven shooting will have a green light to put up quick shots when the situation calls for it."

Senior Lee Verslues, who finished last season with career 1,023 points, scored nine in the game against St. James and will be a key to Fatima's offensive attack.

"He's one of the best point guards in central Missouri," said Robertson. "He has the experience, savvy, and work ethic that will provide great leadership from the point guard position."

Verslues earned Central Missouri Sportswriters & Sportscasters Association first-team All-District honors after scoring

15.6 points a game with 2.5 RPG, 2.8 APG, 2.4 SPG, while hitting 72.6% from the FT line and 30% three-point range. He was also named first-team All-Conference.

Senior Leo Peters (6-6) returns as the team's center after earning All-Conference honorable mention last year.

"He's been battling a knee injury but when healthy, Leo is a nightmare on the block for opponents," said Robertson. "He's an excellent defensive post player with some of the best offensive footwork on the team."

Peters averaged 8.4 points and five rebounds per game with two assists and a steal per contest.

Nate "Kevin" Lehmen (6-5), a senior forward, had one of the best off-season efforts of any player on the roster. "He's a super aggressive player and his effort has been through the roof," said Robertson. "He will be a force defensively and he's scoring on the block better than ever. I expect him to have a great season."

Lehmen averaged 7.6 points and 4.2 rebounds per game last year.

Senior Jacob Vanderfeltz at 6-2 is one of the best rebounders among recent Fatima players, Robertson said. "He creates a mismatch for teams, especially on the glass," the coach added. "He's another player that had a really strong off-season."

Vanderfeltz dealt with injury at times last year and finished with 1.5 points and 3.2 rebounds per contest.

Rounding out the senior class is Carson Schulte, a 5-7 guard. "He's a three-point marksman and a zone-buster," said Robertson. "We look to bring him in off the

bench to shoot teams out of their zone."

Leading the team last year offensively was junior Nate Brandt, a 6-3 guard who scored 17 points a game to go with 5.5 rebounds, three assists, and two steals per contest in earning Central Missouri Sportswriters & Sportscasters Association first-team All-District and first-team All-Conference honors.

"Nate is one of the premier scorers in the state," said Robertson. "He has added size and strength to an already polished skill set. He'll put up big numbers this year."

Fellow juniors are guards Jack Robertson (6-2), Cooper Kleffner (6-0), and Ty Fortson (5-10).

Robertson hit 34.5% from three-point range last year and has improved his range but defensively, he's a beast. "He's a lockdown defender and the first one on the floor," said Coach Robertson. "He's a glue kind of guy for this team."

Kleffner offers an improved offense and will range from point guard to the two-spot because of his ability to step out and hit the trey. "He's a smart player with one of the best basketball IQs on the team," said Robertson. "He'll do a good job handling the ball with Lee, and I expect him to put up some good numbers."

Kleffner finished last season with an average of 8.6 points per game with 3.4 rebounds, 3.6 assists, and 1.2 steals per contest.

Fortson saw time in 17 games last year and this year will be utilized as a backup point guard. "He brings a lot of energy to practice and he's tough," said Robertson.

"If the ball is in his area on defense, he'll create a lot of problems for other teams."

Two sophomores will suit up on varsity this year.

Levi Robinson, a 6-5 forward, is getting better with every practice. "He faces off against Lee and Kev every day in practice and that's making him stronger," said Robertson. "He can score off the block and creates mismatches that will help us."

Easton Haslag, a 6-1 guard, is what Robertson called the newcomer of the year thus far. "He's been excellent through the summer and fall," Robertson said. "He's very athletic and runs the floor well. Easton is a good shooter and he's a lockdown defender too."

Matthew "Munch" Robertson at 6-0 has had an impressive freshman debut during practice. "His effort is extraordinary and his ability to defend means he'll get some varsity minutes," Coach Robertson said.

Rounding out the varsity squad is freshman Max Stuecken, a 5-9 guard. "He's another zone-buster that shot well throughout the fall," said Robertson. "He has shown that he's not intimidated by the older kids and I think he's got a bright future."

Coming off an 18-8 season in 2020-21, Robertson said this year's success will come down to four things: shot selection, limiting turnovers, strong rebounding, and defensive commitment. "If we do those

Lady Comets brings talent, youth to the court

While Fatima has a lot of talented players suiting up for this year's girls basketball season, this is also a young team that will provide a lot of energy.

"We have a lot of juniors and sophomores in the mix this season," said Coach Matt Baker, whose team finished 19-8 last year after a loss in the district championship game to Blair Oaks. "A big group of these girls will give us consistency despite their youth because of the experiences they've had. As long as we can keep everyone focused and not overlooking teams, we can put together a good year."

Fatima lost several seniors to graduation and only two will don the Blue & Gold this year but both were a big part of last year's effort.

Senior forward Morgan Luebbering (6-1) averaged 13.4 points and seven rebounds per game while hitting 70% from the line, 26% from three-point range, and posting 29 blocks as she earned first-team Central Missouri Sportswriters & Sportscasters Association and All-Conference honors.

"Hopefully, she's healthy all year," said Baker. "She's shooting very well and will be our focal point for the year. She'll be double and triple-teamed a lot and she'll have to find the balance between finding cutters and shooters and scoring her own points."

Baker noted that Luebbering will need to score 16-18 points a night for the team to succeed. "She's our key," he added. "She'll need to stay out of foul trouble and above all, remain healthy. We want her to create a

presence in the paint from the start of every game."

Fatima's other senior is Anna Eichholz (5-6 guard). "She is high energy and can play all three guard positions," said Baker. "She's doing a good job of being a leader on this team, she's positive, and working hard. I'll find a way to get her as much time as possible. She is really good off the dribble and ball control will be the key for her."

Alli Robertson, a 5-7 junior guard, scored 7.7 points and grabbed 3.4 rebounds per contest last year on her way to earning second-team All-Conference last year.

"Alli will be a huge piece of the team's success this year," said Baker. "She's taller and stronger than last year and plays both sides of the ball very well. She's a good driver and finishes well at the rim. I love her competitiveness but that's a fine-edged sword. It's a lot easier to pull her back than push her forward so we'll need her to find a good balance."

Junior forward Ellie Brune (5-6) had a solid year, averaging 6.1 points, 2.9 rebounds, 1.1 assists, and 1.2 steals per game in 2020-21.

"Ellie is a very talented player," said Baker. "She's gonna earn her stripes in decision-making this year and she's arguably our best shooter. We'll need her to take good shots. Last year, we had some big wins when she played well, and I think

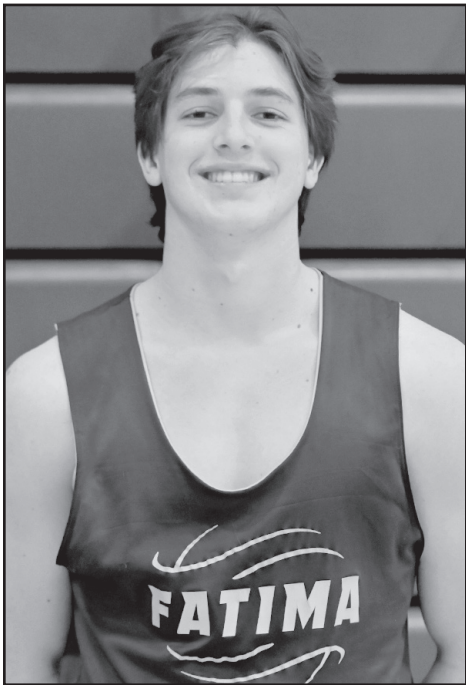

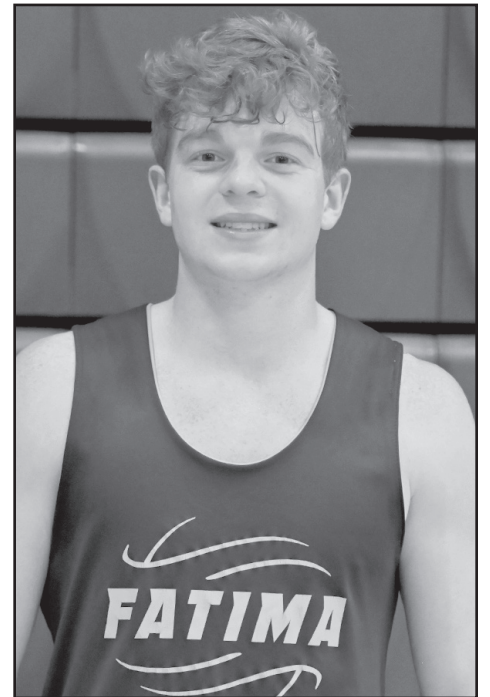

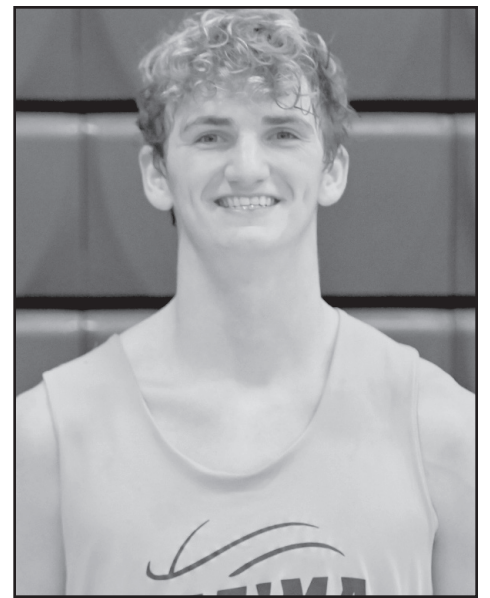

Fatima returns two wrestlers from top-4 team

Fatima entered last season with one goal, to bring home a top-four banner at the conclusion of the state meet, and the Comets did just that, earning fourth place overall in Class 1 to end the 2020-21 campaign.

Senior Luke Schroeder (160-170) earned fourth, just missing a trip to state by one place.

Coach Kurt Strobe said he would have been a state qualifier any other year. "It kind of stinks they only let the top three into the state tournament this year, when in years past they let in the top four," he said last year. "Having said that, Luke had a very good season."

This year, Schroeder is eager to earn a berth at state.

"He was a match away from state last year, and this season, we're looking for him to get to state and onto the podium," said Coach Strobe. "He spent a lot of time in the weight room and attended several camps so he's in really good shape. I think he'll have a very good year."

Sophomore Cody Strobe (106) is the team's other returner, a year removed from a second-place finish at state, where he won resoundingly in his first two matches before losing in the championships to Lucas Barry of St. Michael Archangel 4-1.

He capped off his freshman campaign with some incredible success and with the most wins as a freshman in program history

with 42. “I was very proud of how Cody performed at the state tournament,” said Coach Strobe after last year’s meet. “It was very special to watch him compete. Cody was the first wrestler for us to compete in each round and he got us going in the right direction, getting the seniors that followed him pumped up and ready to perform the best they could. I know he wanted a state title but it will be fun to watch him put in the time and chase after it next year, and in the years to come.”

During the offseason in preparation for the 2021-22 campaign, Strobe has been committed to improving.

“I don’t think he’s been off the mat since last season,” said Coach Strobe. “He wants to get back and win a championship and I’m confident he can achieve that goal.”

Sophomores Tyler Kloepfel, Malaki Nevins, Landon Post, and Chase Willis are new to the mat. “They’re working hard to gain the techniques necessary for success,” said Coach Strobe. “Some have experience but it’s been a bit since they’ve wrestled, and others have no experience and are playing catchup.”

Freshmen Alek Tune, Trevor Herzing, and Landon Bassett have some experience, with all three having competed in the Fatima Kids Wrestling Club, and Tune and Herzing battling at the junior high level last year.

“All three come in with pretty good experience and I’m eager to see how well they’ll do at the high school level,” said Coach Strobe.

On the whole, Strobe said this year’s team will look a little different. “We’re used to being a team with more wrestlers in the lower weights but this year we’ll have the upper weights,” he said. “It will be a different look for me and Les (Rosenborough) in duals.”

In a rebuilding year, Strobe said his goal is for the team to finish in the top 10-20 in the state. “Our goals are simpler,” he said. “We want to be competitive in duals and tournaments and do our best to get some kids out of districts. It’s hard to replace the guys we lost to graduation.”

On the girls’ side, senior Morgan Eggleston (127) and sophomore Skyla Schroeder (137) each went 1-2 in last year’s sectional tournament, losing their first match then winning their second before losing their third match and being eliminated from the tournament.

“Both girls did things that they have not done in the past and won a tremendous amount of matches,” said Coach Strobe after the sectional. “I know both of them wanted to get to state this year; it just didn’t happen. I think if they put in the time in the off-season though and improve just as much as they did this season, both of them should be setting their sights on placing at state next year. I know that is the goal/standard that I am going to hold them to

going forward.”

Their berth in sectionals came after both Lady Comets placed in the top four at the district tournament, with Eggleston going 2-1 on the day for third place, and Skyla Schroeder earning fourth after going 2-2.

Fast-forward to this year and both are looking very strong. “They have worked very hard in the offseason with camps and

spending time in the weight room,” said Strobe. “We hope to get them not only to state but to the podium. That’s not an outrageous goal for either of them.”

Fatima’s junior high program, again coached by Pete Felotico, includes seven wrestlers, with one from Holy Family as part of the cooperative agreement board members approved.

“There’s a lot of raw talent,” said

Coach Strobe. “We’re trying to fine-tune it for several of them. For a few, it’s a matter of building confidence before they hit high school.”

Team members include eighth-graders Nolan Laux, Connor Willis, Jesse Schroeder, and Tucker Tune, and seventh-graders Thomas Kremer, Ryder Herzing, and Mason Bock.

she'll be the measuring stick for us. The team will go as she goes, and will be the difference between us being good and great."

She has a quick release and having her as a point guard in the mix will allow some of our players who have moved to that position to settle back into their normal roles."

Bax will vie for a starting role.

Baker said that with this mix of players, he's expecting the season to be interesting. "There will be a learning curve, especially with our tough schedule," he added. "We're

playing some bigger schools like Carl Junction and Boonville at their place. I want to give the girls a variety of experiences and locations so they get to see some of everything. I think that will help our young team a lot come district time."

Fatima's JV team has been working hard in practice to prepare not only for the upcoming season but for the transition to the varsity level.

"All of these players are freshmen and new to high school basketball," said Coach John Fick. "They're still learning the differences and how to play at the faster speed at this level but they're working very hard in practice."

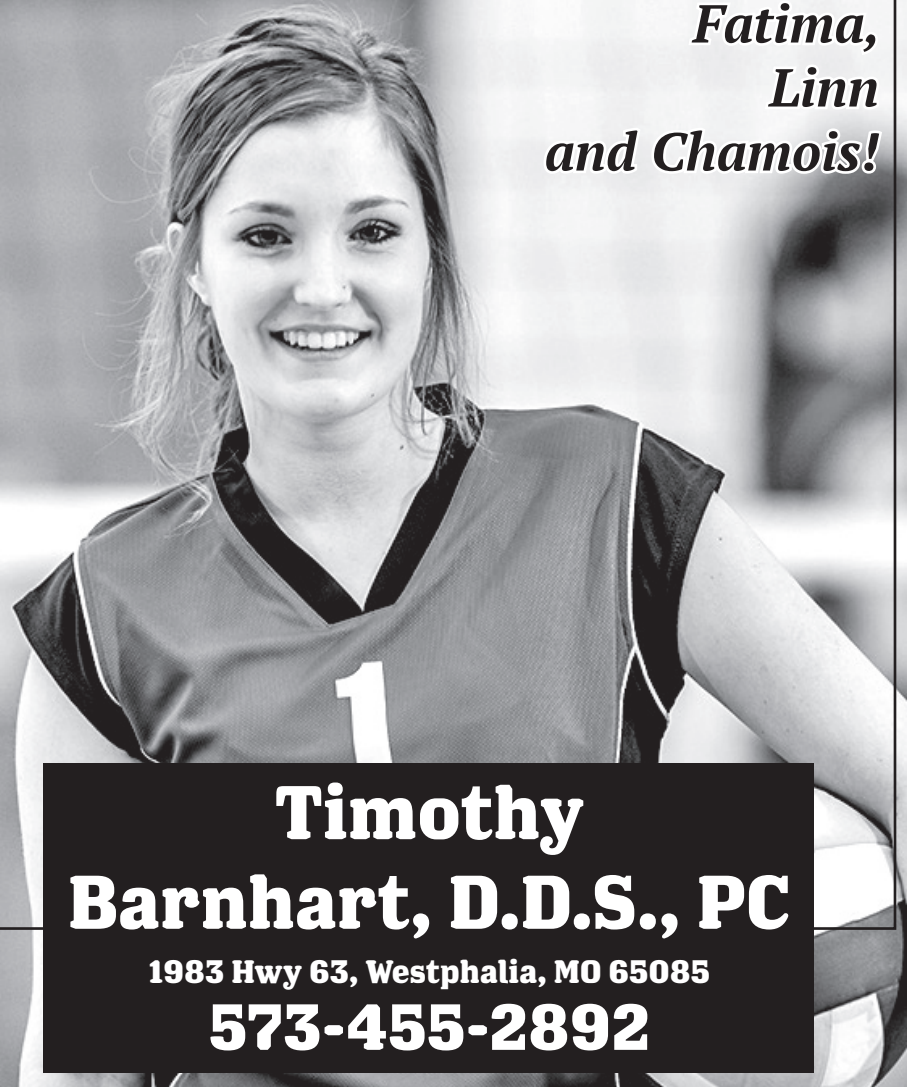
