If immunizations are not current, an "in progress" card from the physician must be submitted to the school nurse prior to August $22^{\text {nd }}$. Please submit updated immunization records prior to August 22. The State of Missouri requires all Seniors and $8^{\text {th }}$ grade students receive a meningococcal (Menactra) vaccine, and all $8^{\text {th }}$ grade students receive a T-dap immunization. If your child has already received either vaccination, please submit documentation to Fatima prior to August 22. If your child has not received either vaccination, or if you are unsure of your child's immunization status, please contact Fatima at 573-455-2375 ext. 1015 or 1014.

K-12 students who reside within the Fatima school district who did not attend Fatima last year and have not yet registered for this year should begin the registration process online at fatimacomets.org/registration. A parent and the student will then need to report to Fatima any day Wed Aug 2 thru Fri Aug 4 between 8:00 AM - 2:00 PM to meet with a guidance counselor to complete the transfer process.
GENERAL INFORMATION: Fatima's new student information database Infinite Campus will be implemented prior to the start of the new school year, making Lumen obsolete. As we navigate away from Lumen, it is important to watch for information regarding the availability of the registration link so that you can complete that portion of the registration process prior to Registration Day/Open House. Therefore, it is important for Fatima to have your current contact information on file! Please contact the HS or Elem office to update your cell number if is incorrect in Lumen.
The first day of school (Tues, Aug 22) breakfast and lunch will be served. A deposit should be made into lunch accounts prior to the start of school. Picture Day for K-12 is Friday, Sept 15 (senior photos will be taken for the class composite). All students must have a photo taken for school lunch ID's. Retake day for K-12 will be Wed, Nov 8. Parking will be addressed at registration on Aug 17.

HS REGISTRATION DAY: Freshman Orientation will be Thurs, Aug 10, 6:30-8:00 pm. Registration Day at Fatima will be Thurs Aug 17, 4pm-7pm. Fatima will be open to all JH and HS students/families - All $\mathbf{7 t h}-12^{\text {th }}$ grade students and a parent/guardian must attend as there will be stations the student and a parent will be required to visit prior to the student being issued a Chromebook. Chromebooks will be issued during Registration Day (there is a \$15 non-refundable deposit). The updated Student Handbook will be available on-line at www.fatimacomets.org. You are strongly encouraged to read it in its entirety prior to Registration Day.

ELEMENTARY OPEN HOUSE: Open House will be Thurs, Aug 17, 5:00-7:00 PM.
SCHOOL BREAKFAST / LUNCH PROGRAM: Aug 22 is a full day of school and breakfast/lunch will be served. Applications for free/reduced school meals will be issued at Registration Day/Open House. If your child qualifies for F/R meals, please know that you are responsible for all charges incurred prior to your application being approved. It is strongly recommended that applications for F/R Meals are returned to school PRIOR to Aug 22. It is also strongly recommended that all families complete and return this form as all qualifying students and the school greatly benefit from this program. All forms are processed with strict confidentiality.

ACTIVITY FEE and PHYSICALS: Students will be assessed a $\$ 20$ PER ACTIVITY fee to participate in clubs/sports (\$100 family cap). All students participating in a school sponsored BAND or SPORTS ACTIVITY must have an active Privit account and completed physical prior to the start of practice. Physical forms can be obtained in the HS office. All students participating in a school activity must be in the drug testing pool or they are ineligible to participate in the activity. Fatima requires a sports physical on a yearly basis.

## Enriching non-sports extracurricular activities

A school experience goes beyond lessons learned in the classroom. Part of what helps shape well-rounded students are the skills they sharpen and memories they make while engaging in extracurricular activities. Extracurricular involvement shows that students can stick with activities for extended periods of time, indicates they have passions and interests, and illustrates that they can take initiative outside of their schoolwork.

Athletics is a popular extracurricular activity. A love of sports often develops in elementary school, with children participating in recreational or school-based leagues each year. That enjoyment of the game only builds in middle school and high school. However, there are plenty of students who are not sports enthusiasts but still fill their after-school hours with activities that can help cultivate leadership, teamwork, time management skills, confidence, and much more. The following are some extracurriculars that go beyond the scholastic playing fields.

- Arts activities: These can include painting, sketching, ceramics, jewelry-making, and yarn work.
- Band or chorus: Music instruction is ideal for those who want to explore a passion for singing or playing an instrument.
- Theater: Students can participate in theater productions after school. It's possible to get involved both in front of the curtain and behind with positions in the cast, crew and even promotional team.
- Newspaper: Many schools still produce student-led newspapers in print or digital versions. Students handle all of the roles, from reporting, editing, photography, and managing the publication.
- Foreign language clubs: Students may want to expand on their foreign language studies by participating in language clubs. Often these clubs include learning more about the cultures where specific languages are spoken, including exploring culinary delights and possible travel.
- Philanthropy: Like-minded students may want to participate in school-organized volunteer activities. These keep students busy, but also benefit recipients in many ways. Activities can include beach sweeps or volunteering at animal shelters.
- Coding and programming: Students can learn the basics of writing code and building computer applications or websites.
- Culinary arts: Certain schools may be equipped with kitchen facilities and still offer elective courses in culinary arts, while others may reserve cooking classes to extracurricular activities. If a school does not have a culinary club, chances are students can find a cooking class offered through a private group.

There are plenty of extracurricular activities to engage students who are not interested in athletics. Students also can start new clubs if there are deficits in offerings at their schools.

## Unique academy, educational tracks in school

Schools continue to evolve and change their curriculum to meet the needs of modern students. Many schools now recognize the importance of helping students develop skills that will help them be competitive in the world and workforce. One way they are doing so is through the development of educational academies or specific academic tracks to give students an advantage later in their academic careers. Here's a close look at such offerings, which tend to be primarily at the high school (secondary school) level.

Early college academy
Early college academy, also known as early college high school, is a program that enables high school students to earn two-year associates degrees at the same time as they earn high school diplomas, according to U.S. News \& World Report. The Early College High School Initiative was established in part in 2002 by the Bill \& Melinda Gates Foundation. Early colleges have expanded over the last 20 years, and these programs may work in different ways. Some bring high schoolers to college campuses to take courses in-person, or there may be remote course offerings.

Others provide college courses in a high school setting. High schools develop complementary relationships with accredited colleges in the area, typically community colleges. Upon completion of the programs, students in the early college courses will receive associates degrees. Advantages to an ECA is that students already have completed two years of college, which saves time and money.

Dual enrollment/Advanced placement

High schools have been offering this option for some time now. Dual enrollment classes are essentially college courses that high schoolers take while in high school. Professors from nearby colleges may teach these courses right in a high school classroom. High school teachers also may be trained to instruct a college's approved coursework. At the end of the course, the student will have received credits for that college course.

Advanced placement (AP) classes are classes with college-level curricula created by the College Board. AP students must pass AP exams at the end of the classes. Certain colleges will accept AP classes as college credit depending
on students' scores on the tests. Both of these avenues may help students earn college credits, provided the school they attend will accept the credits.

Career tracks/pathways
Students may choose to follow particular tracks in high school if they pick a college major or choose a trade school. Sometimes these programs are called pathways. Nevertheless, they may be offered in Visual Arts, STEM, Business Management, Automotive Repair, Hospitality, or Mathematics. While students will still get an array of core classes, by enrolling in a track, their electives and certain other classes may be geared toward a particular pathway. For example, an eligible math course for a business student may be accounting as opposed to calculus for a general education student. These pathways help develop passions and interests and enable high schoolers to grow accustomed to the customization of a degree.

High school has evolved to introduce students to higher education in novel ways.

## Did you know?

High school students are undoubtedly familiar with the belief that extracurricular activities can help separate applicants when seeking admissions to competitive colleges and universities. But research has long indicated that extracurriculars are more than mere résumé-padding activities. A 2019 study published in The Excellence in Education Journal found that students who participated in extracurricular activities earned a significantly higher grade point average than those who did not engage in such activities. The value of that participation has been evident for decades, as the National Center for Education Statistics notes that a 1992 study found that more than 30 percent of students who participated in extracurricular activities had a GPA of 3.0 or higher, while just under 11 percent of non-participants performed that well academically. The potential impact that extracurriculars can have on students' academic performance underscores just how valuable such activities can be and how much students should consider getting more involved at school as their academic careers unfold.

# How to help STEM students fulfill their potential 

Science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM) classes are now integral components of students' educations. Increasingly students are drawn to STEM education, including pursuing STEM pathways in high school, because of the doors such an education can open in the future. According to the United States Department of Labor, there were nearly 10 million workers in STEM occupations in 2021, and this total is projected to grow by almost 11 percent by 2031 - roughly two times faster than the total for all occupations.

STEM subjects may not come so easily for some students, who at times may feel disengaged from the coursework. That doesn't mean students should give up. Even if STEM classes do not come easily, one still could have what it takes to be involved in science or engineering, and eventually land STEM jobs. Here are ways to mold great STEM students.

Recognize that STEM is more exacting

Unlike other classes in liberal arts education that are highly subjective, STEM involves answers that are exact. There is no wiggle room for subjectivity, so students must get in the habit of checking their work and ensuring their
answers are correct. Students may need some assistance from tutors or parents to recognize common mistakes and learn how to proof their work. This fosters a greater attention to detail.

Show the work
Teachers often require students to show the computation involved in reaching a mathematical conclusion, or the reasoning behind how an answer is derived. While the answer may be correct, points may be deducted for not showing the work. Students should make it a habit to be transparent with their calculations so educators can point out where they were right and where they went wrong.

Recognize your own scientific tendencies

Those who are science-minded tend to make good observations, base claims on evidence, express curiosity, and make connections between complex ideas. Some students may not think they are intellectual enough to be involved with STEM, but after recognizing these traits in themselves, they may find they have more in common with great scientists than they first imagined.

Maintain good notes
Get the most out of courses by taking
excellent notes, as the best instruction often comes from lectures and class time. Review notes regularly and practice work frequently.

Have a study buddy
Studying with someone else can be helpful with STEM coursework A study buddy can be a fellow classmate, a parent, a friend, or anyone else to bounce ideas off of. Others view problems differently and may see something a student is missing, or be able to explain it more readily.

See failure as a motivating force
Only by failing can STEM students
dissect missteps and improve work to get to more concrete conclusions. While it initially may not seem enjoyable to fail, it does present opportunity to do things differently the next time. Failure usually lights a fire to get students to work harder and fulfill their potential.

STEM classes can be quite challenging and not every student takes to them immediately. But with a little work and support, students can improve their performance in STEM subjects.
